




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# **Editorial**

In celebrating its fifth year of publication the Natal Provincial Institute's Newsletter is devoting this issue to a listing of Durban buildings of architectural merit. Whilst the listing could by no means be complete, I have no doubt that it would provide a fairly comprehensive overview of what is considered best in the

Because of its ethnic and cultural diversity, metropolitan Durban has a rich variety of buildings and places of architectural and historical interest. These could be summarised under the following

1. Dockland architecture: a wide spectrum of interesting buildings and structures: warehouses and harbour administration buildings in the Point area; the harbour terminal (now to a large extent in disuse); the docks (and ships) themselves, from which interesting marine views of the city can be obtained; as well as the various yacht clubs around the bay.

Corrugated iron architecture: mostly dating from the late 19th and early 20th centuries. These buildings were mostly ordered from catalogues and can still be found in the older suburbs of

Seaview, Bellair, Hillary, Malvern and Northdene. Victorian architecture: characterised by the 'Natal' house, with its intricate corrugated roofs and verandahs, decorative trelliswork in iron and wood and walls of salmon-coloured brickwork. Examples can be found in many of the older, southern suburbs, as well as in the central part of the Berea. Of note in this category are also the suburban stations on the old main line to Pietermaritzburg-Bellairstation, Bothas Hill station, Inchanga station, etc. The old Central Station of Durban, now in danger of being demolished, is a good example of polychromous late Victorian

Public buildings: the civic complex of central Durban: the General Post Office (built in 1885 as Durban's first City Hall); the present City Hall (1903); the City Square; the old Railway Station complex (comprising some of the best examples of Victorian industrial architecture in this country in the form of workshops) and the old Durban Fort in Old Fort Road, form the core of what could be termed 'Historical Durban'. Several buildings within the central city, for instance Norman Eaton's Netherlands Bank Building; the General Accident Building by Mallows, Louw, Hoffe and Hamlin: Shell House by Geoffrey le Sueur, Stauch, Vorster & Partners; the Royal Hotel and the Colonial Mutual of Australia Building, are highrise buildings of note.

Arcades: the central part of the city is characterised by a network of interesting arcades and pedestrian ways. Although many of the most interesting ones have already disappeared under the hammer of demolishers, there are still several older arcades left: for example, Salisbury Aracde between Smith and West Streets. The Madressa Arcade in Grey Street is an outstanding example

as a centre of Durban oriental commerce and is well worth a visit.

Architecture of the thirties and forties: good examples of this style survive on the beachfront, like the Grosvenor Court, Fairhaven and Kangelani apartment blocks; the Natal College Club Building in Smith Street; several residences on the Berea, as well as several Art Deco tower blocks in the Berea Road area. The banking hall of the old Colonial Mutual Building in West Street is a remarkable example of its particular style.

Utility buildings and structures: several bridges (especially in the Albert Park area); the Reservoir Hills reservoir, and general factories in the Mobeni and Jacobs industrial areas are noteworthy because of innovative construction and design. Pump and sub-stations built by the Durban Corporation represent some of the best and most interesting examples in this category.

Hindu Temples: a great variety of temples can be found in the low-lying regions of the city, especially along Bellair and Brickfield Roads, reflecting the important contribution of Hindu culture to the city environment. The Naransamy temple in Newlands is a good example of this type of

Mosques: a large number of mosques can be found around the city but the most interesting are

those in the Grey Street area close to the centre of the city. Housing: a large number of housing schemes have recently been built for lower income populations. Chatsworth, for the Indian population group, developed during the past two decades

by the Durban Corporation is well worth a visit.

Apartment and hotel buildings: a large number of apartment buildings, especially those dating from the 1930s and 1940s can be found in the central city, as well as on the Berea. The most interesting buildings of this type, built during the 1950s, are undoubtedly those by Crofton & Benjamin; those of the 1960s by Hallen & Dibb and Biermann & Theron; and those in the seventies by Da Silva & Smith. Hotels like the Maharani and Elangeni, built during the late seventies, have had a decisive impact on the skyline of the Durban beachfront.

Residential architecture: general noteworthy houses of the late thirties and forties have survived. Notable houses during the 1950s were designed by Crofton & Benjamin; Basil Adkin; Chick Bartholomew & Poole; and Olaf Pretorius. Some notable houses during the sixties were built by Bierman & Theron; Hallen & Dibb; John Frost and others, and during the seventies by Hallen. Theron & Partners Inc., and a generation of younger architects like Ferreira, Da Silva & Smith; Building Design Group and others.





## Some Introductory Remarks

The history of Southern Africa is one of territorial conflict between the various European and Asian settlers, and the indigenous people of the region. Although this legacy now stretches back over several centuries, it still comes as a surprise to discover the extent to which this background continues to influence the essential characteristics of settlement. In Durban, historical

circumstances make it possible to view and experience the resulting patterns of settlement encapsulated in a small geographical area.

Three major historical forces have shaped settlement in Durban and given it its particular character. These are firstly, the 19th century European colonial settlers dominated by the British Empire, secondly, the exotic influence that came with the settlers from the Indian subcontinent, and thirdly, the already-established culture and traditions of the indigenous people into which the colonisation was thrust. These three forces, with all their ramifications, have given Durban the character it now possesses. A fourth, and perhaps even more powerful force is currently at work – the consequences of rapid growth and urbanisation. This has resulted in extensive informal settlement on the urban fringe at the interface between the urban core and the vast rural hinterland that is now KwaZulu. It is this informal settlement, which houses over a third of the city's population, that makes Durban, above all else, the most 'Third World' of all South Africa's cities.

The purpose of the environmental tour, which is being arranged as part of the National Congress programme, is to reveal this historical legacy and the ongoing settlement process. Delegates on this tour will be the guests of the School of Architecture at the University of Natal where an introductory talk will be given by the tour leader, Prof. Ron Davies, a renowned geographer now at the University of Cape Town. In this talk the relationship between the

physical structure of the land and the pattern of urban settlement that resulted from the establishment of the city on the Bay of Natal will be discussed. This will be related back to the route travelled across the Berea en route to the University. Errol Haarhoff will briefly discuss the process and type of informal settlement that will be seen on the tour.

The route will run from the University through Cato Manor, where good examples of Hindu Temples still remain as a reminder that this area was previously the location for Indian residents. Cato Manor was also where vast squatter settlements were cleared in the 60s, and the Black population rehoused at Kwa Mashu to be seen later in the day. The route runs on through the Old Main Line suburbs, the earliest suburban sprawl that followed the old railway to the interior. Here many houses of 19th century origin are still to be seen. A short detour will take the bus through part of Chatsworth, a large township for Indians established in the late 60s. A picnic lunch will be held at the Marianhill Monastery, itself a collection of historical buildings of great merit. The route then runs through the industrial centre of Pinetown, past the Black township of Clermont and through the middle-class suburban areas of Westville and Reservoir Hills, and then north across the Springfield flats and the Umgeni Riverto the Inanda area. Here formal and informal settlements stand in sharp contrast, and visits will be made to Kwa Mashu (Black township), Newlands (Coloured township), the Inanda site and service scheme and the vast informal settlement around Shembe's Village, itself a place of interest. The return trip will pass Phoenix (a new Indian township) and follow a route through Durban North back to the hotel. There is no doubt that this tour will prove to be both an informative and enjoyable experience for Congress delegates.
